ORDINANCE NO. 96-

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF LOGANVILLE, IN YORK COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA REGULATING AND RESTRICTING OUTDOOR FIRES WITHIN THE BOROUGH, AND ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the Council of the Borough of Loganville, York County, Pennsylvania, as follows, to wit:

<u>SECTION 1:</u> No person or persons, firm, corporation, partnership, or association shall set or maintain any fire for any purpose upon any of the streets, sidewalks, alleys, or public grounds in the Borough of Loganville.

SECTION 2: Outdoor fires shall be permitted upon private property in Loganville Borough provided that strict compliance with the following regulations and restrictions is met:

- A. No fire shall be closer than twenty-five (25) feet from any building.
- B. No person shall cause or allow any out door fire to burn anywhere in Loganville Borough at any time between sunset to sunrise.
- c. No wet garbage or other organic matter which smolders or emits offensive odors shall be burned in any fires. It is the intent of this Ordinance to permit the burning of combustible or flammable materials such as dry leaves or paper, which materials will not smolder and emit offensive odors.
 - D. No fire shall be allowed to burn unless an adult person is

thereof of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared as a legislative intent that this Ordinance would have been enacted had such unconstitutional, invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision not have been included herein.

SECTION 5: All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances which are inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 6: This Ordinance shall be and become effective immediately upon enactment hereof.
